
'n' Shit TITTY AS A PICTURE! About a year ago (JUGGS May 98), ART N' SHIT was all in a lather about a very exciting, top-heavy art show by John Currin, Luckily, the JUGGS skyscraper is in close proximity to New York's gallery-heavy SoHo and we were able, early last fall, to marvel at another boob-centric exhibition by a very talented young lady, Lisa Yuskavage, who, as it turns out, is a friend and former schoolchum of John Currin's. Those fancyass art profs at Yale defintely taught these two great artists a thing or two about painting tits: while Currin explored the existential dilemmas of massive, cartoony, artificially inflated tit size, Yuskavage broods dreamily on the mystical aspects of soft, yielding natural titflesh. Yuskavage is a great hand at painting, rendering, in appropriately lush and lurid color, images reminiscent of certain gauzy strokeposters showing young hoydens in pensive, solitary moments. But, as in Currin's work, ownership of bouncy boobs n' butts has a dark side. The babes in Yuskavage's pictures don't seem to be exactly rejoicing in their exuberant sexual attributes. appear to have deformed limbs. They get you hard and they're there for your pleasure, but...what happens after the nookie can often be a nightmare in real life, too.

ART N' SHIT was fortunate enough to speak with the artist. She and tits go back a long way, it seems. At her all-girl school in Philly, she conceived "The Tit-Papers", a passed-around document wherein all the girls were asked to draw their own tits (the book was stolen, probably by a horny all-boy school student). The work which first landed her in Big Deal Art-land was a series of watercolors titled "Tit Heaven". "Tits are wonderful to paint," Ms. Yuskavage told us. "They're such a perfect form and so full of meaning." We totally, totally agree.
